This juicy fruit can be red, yellow, pink, or dark pink on the inside and be seeded or seedless. Watermelon is a flowering ground vine from the gourd family.

A single watermelon is made up of 92% water and is packed with healthy nutrients. They are a good source of antioxidants like vitamin A, vitamin C, vitamin B6, and potassium, magnesium, and dietary fiber. Visit www.alwatermelon.org for more info on watermelons.

New! Landmark Park Launches Outreach Program

Landmark Park is excited to announce that we have received a Micro Grant from the Wiregrass Foundation in the amount of \$8,700 to establish an outreach program with the Dothan Housing Authority. Landmark Park will provide science and history programming once per week from June to December in the community room at McRae Homes to the students who live in a Housing Authority or Section 8 home or facility. By traveling to McRae Homes, the need for transportation and the expenses associated with transportation can be eliminated. These programs will be available to any school-aged child who resides in Section 8 home, Ussery, Henry Green, Johnson Homes, McRae Homes and Marvin Lewis. We hope to reach around 1,000 kids through this educational opportunity. Once school begins, the park will continue to provide after school programming and activities to enhance lessons learned in science and history classes. Using well-established curriculum developed at Landmark Park, our teachers will make learning fun using hands-on activities, simple experiments, live animals, games and crafts. After participating in our programming about the history of our area will give students a better appreciation for the hard work done by our ancestors. Nature-based activities will not only reinforce science lessons but will also create an interest in environmental stewardship and help demonstrate why this is important for our future.

"The heart of Landmark Park's 42-year history is service to the community," says Interim Director Laura Stakelum. "If the entire community cannot benefit from our services due to financial and transportation constraints, we are unable to achieve our goal. This grant from the Wiregrass Foundation will provide educational opportunities to kids who may have no consistent educational enrichment activities after school and during the summer. We are excited and honored to have a chance to bring these opportunities to our community."

Animal Adventures

JUNE 7: TORTOISES

Big Bend Wildlife Refuge will teach us all about the wonderful world of tortoises. Feeding and nesting habits will be discussed, as well as what you should do if you find an orphaned or injured wildlife.

Come learn from Page Whatley about these cold-blooded animals and why some of them are endangered. Visitors will have the opportunity to see different reptiles up-close, all representing the species native to the Wiregrass region.

Tim Ward, with the Alabama Department of Conservation, will present a program on one of South Alabama's most misunderstood creatures, the American Alligator. A combination of slides, skins, and skulls--as well as a live alligator--will be used to illustrate and teach participants about the lifestyle and habitats of this unique animal.

What came first, the chicken or the egg? While we may not crack that riddle, you will have a chance to learn all about chickens and see some of these beautiful animals up close.

JULY 5: DOG TRAINING BASICS

Our four legged furry friends will be the star of this program as local canine specialist Renee Jones-Lewis, along with her canine teaching assistant, show visitors the correct way to interact with dogs. Park visitors will learn training tips they can easily use with their own family pets.

JULY 12: FANTASTIC FISH

Ken Weathers, of the Alabama Wildlife and Freshwater Fisheries Department will present a program about common fish. Not only will you get to see the fish that are naturally found in our local lakes and rivers, you will also be able to brush up on your fishing and casting techniques.

JULY 19: BIRDS OF PREY

Join Jatin Patel and meet his birds of prey. Learn what these beautiful birds eat and what role they play in our environment.

JUNE 22: AMPHIBIANS

Amphibians can be slimy and lay eggs, but they also have a lot of other interesting characteristics. Stiles has been involved in herpetology for over 25 years and is currently working on his PhD in Wildlife Sciences through Auburn University.


