The powerful sounds of Sacred Harp music will fill the air on **Saturday, April 18** when the park will host a Sacred Harp sing in the church. The sing will get underway at 10 a.m. and end at 2:30 p.m. The singers will gather under the spreading branches of a nearby live oak tree to enjoy a traditional dinner on the grounds from noon - 1 p.m. Prior to the sing, there will be a short introduction for visitors unfamiliar with the tradition (also known as Shape Note or Fasola) beginning at 9:30 a.m. Admission is free with paid gate admission (\$4 for adults, \$3 for kids, free for members) and free for singers with a Sacred Harp book.

Playground Build

The weather was miserable, but the weekend was beautiful. Landmark Park is set in the time period around the turn of the 20th century. A historically accurate event for that era would be a barn raising. The labor for a barn to be constructed required more than an individual family could provide. Therefore, the community rallied around each other and, one at a time, in only a day or two, barns were built. The men used their tools and their strength. The women fed the crowd, tidied, and cheered. Everybody contributed according to their skills and abilities. Old friends were appreciated. New friends were made. Conversation abounded. On Friday, January 3, and Saturday, January 4, in the atmosphere of a good, old-fashioned barn raising, Landmark Park volunteers built a new playground. Like a barn raising, the playground build was well-organized with much preparation done in advance.

A call went out from the park for manpower. And folks responded. Former employees returned. Current employees asked to not be on the clock. Board members put on their muck boots. Buffalo Rock sent a 9-member team on their dime. Park members read about it in "The Lark." Local citizens heard about it on local media. City of Dothan representatives, who have built several playgrounds for Leisure Services parks, lent experienced hands.

"I helped build the last playground, so I wanted to help with this one, too," was overheard several times.

The volunteers of all ages, races, religions provided their experiences. Young adults who grew up playing at the park, literally and figuratively, tore down their childhood playground and built another in the same place for the next generation.

It was a fine day at Landmark Park.

Leafcutter Bee Workshop

On **April 25**, Alabama Cooperative Extension Agent Philip Carter will present a workshop on the native leafcutter bee in the Interpretive Center Auditorium at 10 a.m. This workshop is free with paid gate admission (\$4 for adults, \$3 for kids, free for members). Registration is required and can be made at www.landmarkparkdothan.com. While most people think of honeybees as pollinators, native bees are actually responsible for even more pollination than the European honeybee. Leafcutters are solitary, rather than existing in a hive like the honeybee. While their homes may often be near others, they do not interact with each other. All females are queens and will only sting if threatened. The queen collects pollen and nectar, lays and protects eggs. She seals each egg chamber with cut leaf bits and other leafcutter bees honor her space. She will only lay eggs in her own home. Males fertilize the females and then die within two weeks.
