New! Longleaf Pine Exhibit Coming Soon

Landmark Park is pleased to announce a partnership with Backstory Educational Media and Kelton Design to install an interactive exhibit on the Longleaf Pine Ecosystem, which will be built in the Interpretive Center Lobby. The exhibit will include artifacts, taxidermy, rocks and minerals, live animals, interactive displays and more. It is slated to be complete by the end of 2021. Backstory Media has created a panel of local scholars to help tell the story of our native forests.

Founded by writer and curator Phillip Ratliff, Backstory Educational Media brings interpretive design, including exhibits and audio storytelling, to the museum world and beyond. Kelton Design has 30 years experience planning, designing, and building museums and their exhibits. Volunteer Spotlight: Bill Miller and the Wiregrass Beekeepers



Perhaps Bill Miller tells the bees about himself. Perhaps not, but if you find him at Landmark Park, he will tell you about bees. He will have on his ball cap that says, “Shalom, y’all,” and with twinkles in both eyes, he will tell you

about giving his daughter her own hive for her birthday when she was child.

She asked, “Daddy, when I get stung, can I say &%%\$**, like you do?”

“Only if your mother doesn’t hear you,” he quipped.

Bill, along with Steve Loveland, Susan Rigsby, and Dwayne Sayers, are members of Wiregrass Beekeepers Association who mind the park’s two apiaries: one near the Ag museum and the larger one, used for teaching, back in the open field near the dog walking path. They hold a Meet the Beekeepers class the third Saturday of every month at 10 a.m. In the 1970s, in Maryland, Bill and a friend were gardeners, whose interest in beekeeping was sparked by the Whole Earth Catalog. “It was a hippie thing.”

Born in New Jersey, Bill married Mary in 1973, and they lived several places before work brought

him to Farley Nuclear Plant in 2006. They have a son, Jeremy, and a daughter, Kate. When Kate was a teenager, she read “10 Dorky Things Your Father Does” in Seventeen magazine and beekeeping was on the list. She quit beekeeping immediately. Now, her father-in-law keeps bees.

“Beekeeping is addictive,” Bill said.

Bees start swarming in March. If you find a swarm in your yard, don’t bother the bees, and they won’t bother you. Contact the Wiregrass Beekeepers and someone will take your hive to a safer spot. Like Landmark Park!

Bill’s advises beginning beekeepers, “You will get into adventures that will be funny in a year that are not funny when they happen.”

Don’t Forget About These Regularly Scheduled Events

The following events take place monthly and are free with your paid gate admission (\$4 for adults, \$3 for kids, free for park members).

The Wiregrass Woodturners host a club meeting and woodturning demo every **first Saturday** of the month at 9:30 a.m. The public is invited to visit and learn how to make beautiful wooden items turned on a lathe. Wiregrass Woodturner members get in free. Meets in the Interpretive Center Classroom.

The Landmark Dulcimer Club has a jam and practice session every **first Saturday** of the month at 1 p.m. You do not have to know how to read music! We prefer you bring your own Mountain Dulcimer but we do have a few practice dulcimers you can borrow if you want to give it a try. Show your instrument and get in for free! Meets in the Interpretive Center Auditorium.

Landmark Park hosts a Reptile Feeding every **first Sunday** at 4 p.m. Meet our snakes and turtles and learn why these animals are so important to the environment. Interpretive Center Lobby.

Every **second Saturday** join the Evening Star Quilt Guild with your textile-based crafts for an informal sewing circle at the Landmark Park Sit and Sew from 10 a.m.-3 p.m. Free for Quilt Guild members. Space is limited, first come first served. Meets in Interpretive Center Auditorium.



Pickin’ in the Park takes place every **second Saturday** of the month at 10 a.m. Join musicians for a bluegrass, country and gospel jam session. Visitors are welcome to listen or participate. Show your instrument at the gate to receive free admission. All ages and skill levels are welcome.

The Wiregrass Forge will present a Blacksmithing Demo every **third Saturday** of the month at 10 a.m. Watch as metal is heated and shaped into a variety of items.

Meet the Beekeepers is hosted by the Wiregrass Beekeepers. Observe the beekeepers at work and learn about honeybees. The meeting will begin in the Auditorium at 10 a.m. every **third Saturday** and then will move to the Observation Hives near the Ag Museum at noon (weather permitting). Veil is required for your safety. While bees are generally not aggressive, please do not attend this session if you are allergic!

Join Alisa Hamm in the Watson Cabin on the **fourth Saturday** of the month from 10 a.m.-noon and watch as she cooks over an open hearth.

Spring Forest Tour

Landmark Park is located just miles from the Choctawhatchee River watershed. What makes this part of Alabama so fascinating is that this watershed is known to have more species of trees than any temperate watershed in North America! With such a diverse population of tree species, most with fascinating stories about their historical and cultural uses, and easy access to most from the boardwalk, Landmark Park is the perfect location to see and learn about these trees and other plants that make the Wiregrass area such a unique place.

Ed Lewis, a local forester and park volunteer, will host two Spring Forest Tours at Landmark Park and provide information about many of the species in the park. You may know Ed from his Crosscut Saw demonstration during Spring and Fall Farm Days. The tour will be mostly on the boardwalk, allowing you to learn about and see both upland and wetland tree species and plants, along with information on how settlers, Native Americans, and modern people make use of our forest resources in the Wiregrass. Participants will receive a booklet that includes pictures and descriptions of species discussed. Each session will take place on **April 10** and last about two hours. The first tour will begin at 9:30 a.m. and the second tour will start at 1 p.m.

This fun and fact-filled program begins in the Interpretive Center Auditorium and registration is required. Classes are limited to 20 people per session. MARCH 29 • SODA SHOP MEMORIES

MARCH 30 • BIG BEND

Veteran's Gardening Project Coming to Landmark Park

Alabama Cooperative Extension System (ACES), Landmark Park and the Wiregrass Resource Conservation and Development Council (RC&D) are partnering to launch a new Veteran's Gardening Project at the park. This project will build and strengthen the local food system while providing veterans and their families the opportunity to come together for a hands-on, mission-driven, gardening project. From tomatoes to native pollinator beds, veterans from all age groups and backgrounds will be invited to utilize the raised bed gardens at Landmark Park.

The program will host a series of workshops that will cover the basics of gardening for those who are just beginning their green thumb journey as well as other topics for those who are more experienced. All programs will be held at Landmark Park and a short workday will follow the educational aspect, weather dependent. The garden will be open during Landmark Park's normal business hours to any veteran and their families (or friends) who wish to come out and work in the garden. You will be allowed free entry, but we ask that you sign in at the gate and that you record what you worked on in a binder that will be stationed near the garden. Tools will be available to use while at the park and seeds will be provided. We ask that you bring your own gardening gloves. Any additional produce not harvested for personal use will be sent to the local food bank as part of Alabama Extension's Grow More Give More program. There will be workshops held every third Saturday and every third Wednesday on opposite schedules. Each workshop will begin at 9 a.m. and will last an hour with a two-hour workday following the educational event. Come by for a socially distanced in-person event.

Our last session for the season will most likely end before all the produce has been harvested and we hope that participants will continue to come and take care of the beds so that the harvest will be bountiful! 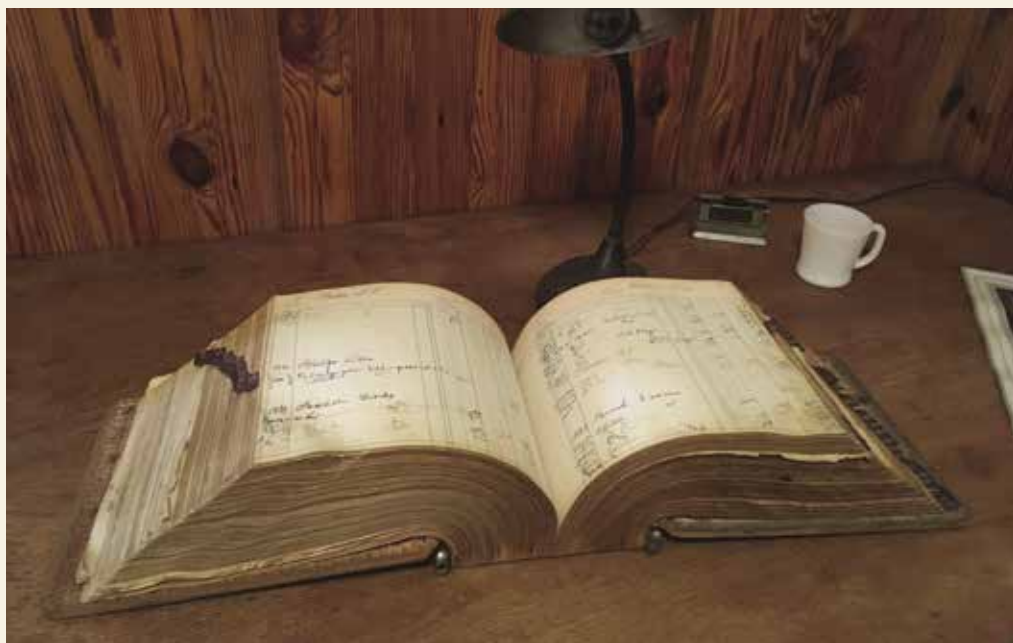

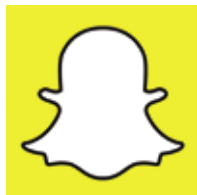
